

Definitions:

- "Home and Community Based Services (HCBS)":
 Services provided in a person's home or community rather than institutions or isolated settings.
- "Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS)": The federal agency that oversees distribution of funds through Medicaid waiver program.
- "Final Rule": Change to federal regulation regarding Medicaid funds that pay for Home and Community Based Services (HCBS). The rule applies to settings where services are provided, both residential and non-residential.



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The Final Rule is all about:

Ensuring that all individuals receiving Home and Community Based services have <u>full access</u> to the benefits of community life.

Services are <u>individualized</u>, and promote <u>inclusion</u>.



The Final Rule has five main components:

- 1. Access to the **community**.
- 2. Ensuring Person Centered Planning.
- 3. Protection of rights.
- 4. Promoting independence.
- 5. Supporting individual choice.



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- Adult Family Home
- Adult Residential Facility

- Certified Family Home
- Family Child Care Home

- Foster Family Home

6. A legally enforceable agreement between the provider and client that allows the client to own, rent, or occupy the residence and provides protection against eviction.

A written agreement:

- -RC Admissions Agreement is acceptable for vendored care homes.
- -Has it been reviewed and explained in a way that all can understand?
- -Is it signed by all parties?
- -Are individuals informed about how to relocate and request new housing?





7. Privacy in units including lockable doors, choice of roommates and freedom to furnish and decorate units.

Privacy:

- -Lockable doors: bedroom, bathroom, key to front door
- -Choice of single room or of roommates
- -Freedom to furnish and decorate units.



8. Options for individuals to control their own schedules including access to food at any time.



Controlling own schedules and activities:

- -Access to food at any time
- -Preferred work schedule
- -Sleep schedule
- -Socializing / Recreation



9. Individual's freedom to have visitors at any time.





Visitors:

- -Are visiting hours posted?
- -Are residents encouraged to host friends, family, and significant others?
- -Are residents supported to go out with others?
- -Troubleshooting should be done on a case by case basis.



10. The setting is physically accessible to the individual.



Accessibility:

- -Grab bars, ramps
- -Appliances, furniture
- -Freedom to move about in the home

Consider:

- -Any activities that staff currently do on behalf of residents
- -CCL requirements



"What About...?"

The federal rules do allow for some flexibility when:

- 1. There is an assessed need
- 2. The need is described and addressed in the Person Centered Plan (IPP/ISP)
- 3. The need is reviewed regularly



Food for thought:


- -Does the setting feel like a facility, or does it feel homey?
