Over the past several editions of this newsletter, we have highlighted one of the four Focus Areas included in our agency's Strategic Plan. In this edition, we will turn our attention to Client and Family Support. This focus area incorporates the needs and desires of clients and families to receive services and supports in the ways that work best for them. Through one time funding, our regional center has been able to address language access needs, non-traditional service hour restrictions and geographic incentives to increase opportunities for many of our Early Start families who have experienced barriers to service. We continue to listen to our communities to learn where to concentrate our efforts and initiatives. Additionally, we remain engaged with the promotion of the DSP Collaborative between Valley Mountain Regional Center (VMRC) and Alta California Regional Center (ACRC). This collaboration concentrates on rebuilding the workforce of Direct Support Professionals (DSPs).

In order to provide accessible and available resources to our clients and their families, the workforce must be intact. We stand committed to doing all that we can to support our providers so that they, in turn will be able to support you! ACRC was thrilled to see that the Governor recognized the work and dedication of those who proudly and professionally support people with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities. There are so many people to spotlight and celebrate and as you read on, we hope that you will enjoy reading about a few of them. They represent all that is good with our service system. We know that rebuilding the workforce will not happen overnight. Our efforts are not short sighted. We are developing strategies that will support us for the long game. We recognize that many clients have yet to return to prepandemic service levels and thank you for your patience and understanding as we reimagine our service system. We have transitioned as of October 1st, to a transportation broker, R & D Transportation, to assist ACRC in maximizing transportation routes and efficiencies that will include increasing capacity.

This month, ACRC is happy to support and promote Conferencia 2023, Aprendiendo Juntos on October 28th at the UC Davis MIND Institute. 2022-2025 STRATEGIC PLAN

Focus area definition:

The regional center will explore greater flexibility and more family-centered services and supports so that people with intellectual/developmental disabilities can continue to live at home and be supported in ways that make sense for them.

Community input:

- Families need help to identify community resources.
- Families want to find people to support them that they trust and who understand their language and culture.
- There is a growing need to attract and retain a direct support workforce that represents a variety of cultures and languages.
- Families seek greater flexibility to design support that works for their family.


- The **Regional Center Employee Tuition Reimbursement** program provides tuition reimbursement for eligible regional center employees and is meant to enhance regional center services received by consumers through increasing subject matter expertise and career advancement options and improving employee retention rates at regional centers.
- The DSP Training Stipend program provides training stipends to DSPs who complete training and development courses.
- The **Bi-/Multi-Lingual Pay Differential** provides a pay differential to DSPs who communicate regularly with individuals and families in a language or medium other than English.
- The **DSP Internship** program provides an internship for up to three months and includes standardized training and practical work experience for new entry-level direct care workforce DSPs.
- The DSP University program is a three-tiered, competency-based training and certification program for DSPs and is designed to enhance DSPs professional training. Successful completion of each tier is tied to wage differentials.
- The Technology Pilot program will explore the use of technology, when chosen and safe, to assist
 individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD). DDS will measure how the use of
 technology reduces reliance on in-person services, increases access to bilingual services, and provides
 an effective option for individuals with I/DD to lead more independent lives.

SUPPORTED DECISION MAKING UPDATE ROBIN BLACK ACRC LEGAL SERVICES MANAGER

Last fall, the California legislature passed new laws (Welfare and Institutions Code sections 21000-21008) to define supported decision-making (SDM) as an individualized process of supporting and accommodating adults with disabilities to enable them to make life decisions without impeding the self-determination of the adult. In the new laws, the State legislature acknowledged that "like adults without disabilities, adults with disabilities may use a wide range of voluntary supports to help them understand, make, and communicate their own decisions." The law requires that SDM agreements be in writing, accessible to the person with a disability, contain specific information, and meet specific legal requirements.

ACRC is excited for this new opportunity for our clients to increase their choice and self-determination in decision-making. Realizing that no resources or training materials exist specific to California's requirements, and wanting to have this opportunity accessible to its clients, ACRC last Spring convened an SDM Training Workgroup to help develop and provide training on SDM. The Workgroup includes ACRC clients from its Client Advisory Committee, representatives from the State Council of Developmental Disabilities, ACRC's Client Advocates, as well as members of ACRC's Training and Legal Departments and Executive Management.

The Workgroup has been meeting monthly since May 2023 to identify existing SDM resource and training materials and to adapt them for use to meet California's specific SDM requirements. Once training materials have been adapted, the Workgroup will be working to schedule and deliver regular trainings in SDM to clients and their families, as well as ACRC staff, and community members, in a variety of different formats in order to best meet everyone's needs.

SIERRA COLLEGE TO HOST PROVIDER JOB FAIR

Early in 2023 ACRC partnered with VMRC to develop the DSP Collaborative for the purposes of supporting the hiring needs of regional center service providers. We've created a website dspcollaborative.org and begun hosting regional center service provider specific job fairs. As we continue these efforts, we are happy to announce, Sierra College will host a job fair for regional center service providers on November 7, 2023, from 10am-2pm. The event will be held in the cafeteria at the main campus 5100 Sierra College Blvd Rocklin, CA 95677. CLIENT SPOTLIGHT - LESLEE



Leslee was frustrated about being unemployed but thought the perfect job was out there for her and it began with Rover, a platform for pet owners to hire pet sitters. She is passionate about caring for animals and knew she could excel in being a pet sitter. Motivated, Leslee built a profile and got her first customer in 2018. She received a positive review and then the customers kept coming.

Building a business takes a lot of time and money management so Leslee sought the help of In Alliance, a program funded through the regional center that helps clients develop work and life skills. With the assistance of her program, Leslee started her business and now works as a pet sitter full time. She transitioned to receiving support from a facilitator with Blue Heron Programs who helps her manage the finances based on Leslee's needs and determined goals. Her success in these programs is evident because in July, she received Employee of the Month from Blue Heron!

She attributes her passion for caring for animals to her dogs, Gorgeous, who has been with her for 13 years, and Handsome, who passed away during the pandemic. The story of how Leslee came to meet Gorgeous is important to them both. Leslee saw her in a Craigslist ad stating to adopt the dog before she gets taken to the shelter. Immediately infatuated with the dog based on the pictures alone, Leslee called the number listed in the ad and unfortunately was immediately rejected because they believed Leslee was mocking them because the dog has three legs.

However, Leslee is persistent and used the knowledge she gained from programs on boundaries and communication and tried calling the number again. Her persistence paid off and Gorgeous became a part of the family.

Pet sitting makes Leslee happy, and she enjoys being her own boss and deciding her clientele. Her passion is clear based on the level of one more time. She stated she was serious about adopting the dog, and that she was not mocking them and genuinely loved everything that makes Gorgeous unique. Leslee's deeply cares for each of the animals she pet sits for. This is proven by the immense amount of positive reviews she has received.
