



Why a Housing Focus?






Community input:

- •There is a shortage of affordable housing in communities where people want to live.
- •Housing that is available, is not always accessible.
- •There is a shortage of support professionals to assist at home.
- •There is a need to support clients and families to plan for long term future housing needs

What we want to achieve:

- •More <u>ACRC</u> clients will be able to access affordable housing including set aside units.
- •More ACRC clients will have caregiver succession plans in place that describe living arrangements and desired supports.





Efforts to Address the Needs of Aging Clients and Caregivers





Coordinated Future Planning

SCs are trained and equipped with skills to identify and document the housing needs of clients and support needs for caregivers.



Housing Development

ACRC actively pursues opportunities to support a range of different housing options for regional center clients.



DSP Collaborative

In collaboration with VMRC, ACRC has launched an initiative to support the hiring needs of regional center service providers.



Disability Housing Alliance

ACRC meets monthly with clients, family members, advocates, and community stakeholders to support housing development.



Vendored Supports

ACRC has both Housing Access Services and Coordinated Family Supports vendors available to help clients and families with planning.

Coordinated Future Planning

Current Process

A regional center initiative to increase housing stability and prevent homelessness for adults with developmental disabilities (I/DD) living with aged caregivers



Service Coordinator (SC) meets An IPP is created that does not annually with adults with I/DD address caregiver succession or and aged caregivers to develop an Individual Program Plan (IPP).

Year after year this continues until the aged caregiver is no longer able to provide support.




If the aged caregiver is hospitalized, the adult with I/DD may be admitted with them.

The client has lost their housing and requires an emergency placement by the SC, likely into a congregate setting, which may not be their preference.

Proposed Process



During the annual IPP meeting SC determines if the primary caregiver is over 70 and if a caregiver succession plan exists.



SC attends training developed and presented by CFP Task Force with instruction on caregiver succession planning and offering opportunities for a range of living options.



SC holds a person-centered IPP meeting which discusses caregiver succession and and different types of living arrangements.




An IPP is created that indicates who the next caregiver will be and, as applicable, the steps the client would like to take toward their preferred living arrangement.



When inevitably their aged caretaker becomes unable to support them, there is a plan in place and the client doesn't needlessly have to face housing insecurity.

How many clients live with caregivers over age 70? Is there a caregiver succession plan?

Stakeholders

Partner with clients, families, advocates and providers. To develop trainings for service coordinators.

Training

New requirements to document assessment for caregiver succession and discussion of all living options.

Caregiver Succession Planning New State Law – AB 3291 Assembly Committee on Human Services

Assembly Bill Analysis -

The Alta California Regional Center launched a Coordinated Future Planning Taskforce with this looming problem in mind. The initiative calls on a group of stakeholders: clients, family members, advocates, and service providers to join with regional center staff in both developing and delivering training to service coordinators.

This training focuses on the need for caregiver succession plans for each regional center client, as well as seeking to increase the competencies of service coordinators in discussing a range of living options at IPP meetings. The training has four learning objectives:

- Recognize the benefit of reflecting on your own beliefs about dying and end of life care and the impact that may have on your ability to help others with future life planning.
- Dialogue with clients and families, in a culturally respectful, sensitive and humble way, regarding caregiver succession planning using appropriate language.
- Articulate the benefit to clients and families of early planning for caregiver succession.
- Describe a range of living options, including independent living, supported living, family home agencies, and residential care, to clients and their families. Create a person-centered IPP narrative that captures the wishes of the client and planning team in relation to future living options. Share future planning tools that can assist clients and families related to accessing affordable housing, power-ofattorney, special needs trust, CalABLE, conservatorship, and end-of-life care decisions.

This bill aligns with Alta's efforts by making caregiver succession planning a part of the IPP process for all 21 regional centers.

California Welfare and Institutions Code 4646.5(a)(9) (A) When a regional center consumer is being cared for in the family home, no later than the consumer's 22nd birthday, and annually thereafter, a discussion regarding caregiver succession and, if determined by the consumer or the consumer's representative to be necessary, development of a caregiver succession plan, which may include, but is not limited to, both of the following:

- (i) Identification of individuals who may provide care to the consumer when the current caregiver is no longer able to perform the necessary tasks.
- (ii) Identification of possible housing options for the regional center consumer when the consumer can no longer live at home.
- (B) For purposes of this paragraph, "caregiver succession" means the point at which the primary caregiver is no longer able to fully care for a regional center consumer.



ACRC clients pay 1/3 of their monthly income = Rent and utilities


- Only eligibility requirement is an ACRC client must be eligible for a Housing Choice (Section 8) Voucher
- 12 one-bedroom apartments
- 3 two-bedroom apartments
- 10 units are fully ADA compliant "special needs"
- 5 units will be "visitable" by a person in a wheelchair. Flat thresholds, either ground floor or elevator units




The Heights on Stockton



10 Units of Affordable Housing


- 30% AMI for 55 years

 - bus stops directly in front of the entrance to the complex.





Assistive Technology Pilot

DDS Workforce Initiative

The pilot program will explore the use of technology to deliver remote services and supports to individuals with intellectual/developmental disabilities.

Technology services are intended to provide supports and services necessary for individuals to access services remotely and meet the goals identified in their Individual Program Plans.

The **goal of the program** is to provide support of the participant's individual program plan goals, reduce the need for a direct support person and enable the participant greater independence, inclusion, and quality of life.

















Introductions/announcements

Data needs: 1-Identify the number of persons requiring supportive housing to create a goal for development of housing models. (John Decker, Alta Regional will provide additional data to understand the scope of the need).

Of 1883 in Yolo Co. receiving services from Alta over 1500 live with a parent/guardian (the rest in residential services and supportive housing). Alta Regional succession planning project: Training ready to start on Oct. 31with the 2 Yolo Co. case managers. Project will include getting input on needs for independent living.


Data requests: Break down numbers for 23-54 to better understand needs of caregivers. Request data be sorted by 10 year increments. The system does not have data on the age of parents. No data on if caregiver has disability themselves. Look for ways to identify how many caregivers are looking for supportive housing.

John reports new growing trend of increasing numbers of persons diagnosed with Autism but without intellectual disabilities.

Yolo County Housing Element

Discussion of how to look at the housing element and for what purpose. Commission can support the implementation of housing for special populations already in the housing element. Yolo County Housing also has a focus on at risk populations.

Current proposal for housing in Woodland: John is assisting with a CHELSE Investment Corp. in Woodland proposal for independent low income housing that includes some
